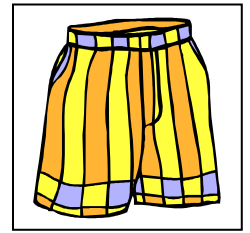


MICHIGAN CHRISTIAN YOUTH CAMP DRESS & APPEARANCE CODE



Youth Ministers, parent's & chaperones are responsible for ensuring that the campers comply with the dress and appearance code at MCYC. We suggest that you review this with all those participating BEFORE they pack for camp and make sure they completely understand our dress and appearance code. If there are any problems while at camp, it will be your responsibility to see that all in your group meet dress code. You may need to take your children/group to Wal-Mart, Goodwill, etc. to find suitable clothing.

Modesty is important and, because of this, we have a few rules concerning our dress code:

- A. Inappropriate clothing includes, but is not limited to, halter tops, sundresses, bare midriff tops, athletic shirts, cut-off t-shirts, strapless tops, spaghetti strap tops, or tank tops are not permitted. Tops need to have at least two straps that are at least four fingers in width. No clothing that exposes any part of the mid-drift when standing, sitting or bending over. All tops should be long enough to be tucked in.
- B. Shorts and skirts may be worn, but they must be modest length. At MCYC, we define "modest" as those shorts that are below the fingertips when standing straight, arms to the side. This length applies to athletic shorts as well.
- C. No pants/sweatpants or shorts with wording on the buttocks are permitted. Young ladies are asked not to bring any shirts/tops that reveal cleavage.
- D. Swimsuits should be modest and we ask that they are one-piece suits. Should you come without a one-piece suit you will have to wear a dark colored t-shirt over your suit. Shirts and shorts should always be worn over your bathing suit when outside of the waterfront area.
- E. No shirts, hats, pants or other inappropriate clothing with inappropriate messages: alcohol, tobacco profanity, sexual references or drugs.
- F. When it is raining, campers should refrain from wearing white shirts that could show through.

Should there be any severe issues, the parent will be called. Should we have continued issues with the same camper it could lead to dismissal from camp.
